At the airport (1)

1. Baggage (US) Luggage (UK) suitcase

- a. all the suitcases and bags that you take with you when you travel (US)
- b. the bags, suitcases, etc. that contain your possessions and that you take with you when you are travelling (UK)
- c. a large, rectangular container with a handle and often with wheels, for carrying clothes and possessions while travelling

2. Carry bring take

- a. "Carry" means to move while supporting, either in a vehicle or in one's hand or on one's body. (Transport)
 Example: I had to carry my suitcases from reception up to my room. She carried the child down the stairs. He carried the chairs three at a time.
- b. "Bring" means moving something or someone. The movement is either from where the listener is to where the speaker is, or from the speaker to the listener. (Move towards the speaker or the listener's place)

Example: Next time don't forget to **bring me** a copy of you work. Do you want me to **bring** my guitar? (B will carry the guitar to the place where A will be.)

c. "Take" means moving something or someone from where the speaker or listener is to a different place (Move away from the speaker or listener, to a different place)
Example: Could you take these report to Peter's office.
I can take you to the station tomorrow. What time's your train? (Neither the speaker nor the listener is at the station; it is a different place.)

3. Unattended abandoned unwatched

- **a. Unattended** without the owner present; not being watched or cared for
- b. abandoned left and no longer wanted, used or needed
- c. unwatched (of an automatic device, such as

a beacon) not manned, with no one to control or operate it

4. Travel voyage go on a trip

- a. to go from one place to another, especially over a long distance
- b. (literary) to travel, especially in a ship and over a long distance
- c. Go on a journey to a place and back again, especially a short one for pleasure or a particular purpose

5. Place put set

- **a. Place** to put something in a particular place, especially when you do it carefully or deliberately
- **b.** Put to move something into a particular place or position
- **c. Set** to put something in a particular place or posture, especially when you do it carefully or deliberately

PLACE	He placed his hand on her shoulder
	She placed a large dish in front of me
PUT	Put the cases down there, please.
	Did you put sugar in my coffee?
SET	Set that vase on the table, please!

6. Ticket

a printed piece of paper that gives you the right to travel on a particular bus, train, etc.

7. Aisle

a passage between rows of seats in a building such as a church or theatre, an aircraft, or train

8. Window seat

a seat next to a window, on a plane or train.

9. aisle seat

a seat, esp on a plane, situated at the end of a row, adjacent to the aisle
