She **booked** a flight to Chicago

The performance is **booked up**

To Arrive:

- I was pleased to hear you arrived home safely.
- The police arrived to arrest him.

arrive at/in/on...

- She'll arrive in New York at noon.
- The train arrived **at** the station 20 minutes late.
